CACTWC Who we are what we do

- We provide education and information to Connecticut's municipal CCs and IWCs, and their staff
- We are the only continuous education and information source available to CCs & IWCs
- Our members are municipal CC and IWC commissions

WHO YOU ARE WHAT YOU DO

- Community volunteers that care about the lands in your community
- Almost all decisions on how lands are to be utilized in CT are made at the local level.
 - YOU influence those decisions. YOU make a difference in your community!

WHAT YOU ARE ENABLED TO DO

- Powers & duties set forth in Section 7-131a of the CT General Statutes
- CT Conservation Commissions 'shall'
 - conduct research into the utilization of land areas of the municipality
 - keep an index of all open areas, public or private, including wetlands, for the purpose of obtaining information on the proper use of such areas
 - approve all grants submitted by any agency of the town for programs that preserve open space, or restrict it for conservation or recreation purpose.
 - keep records of meetings, activities; do an annual report

WHAT YOU ARE ENABLED TO DO

- CT Conservation Commissions 'may'
 - propose a greenways plan for inclusion in the municipal POCD
 - inventory natural resources
 - formulate watershed management and drought management plans
 - if the municipality so provides, apply for state grants for programs that preserve open space, or restrict it for conservation or recreation purpose.
 - recommend plans and programs to the planning commission for the development and use of open space areas
 - make recommendations on proposed land use changes to P&Z commissions and IWCs and other municipal agencies

WHAT YOU ARE ENABLED TO DO

- CT Conservation Commissions 'may' (cont)
 - advertise, prepare, distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets as necessary for CC purpose
 - supervise and manage municipal parks and open space,
 provided the authority has been so delegated
 - with the approval of the legislative body, establish rules and regulations to serve the CC purpose, including establishing charges for the use of land and easements
 - receive gifts in the name of the municipality for any of its purposes, and <u>must</u> administer such gifts for those purposes subject to the terms of the gift
 - acquire land and easements in the name of the municipality

WHAT YOU ARE DOING....

- We asked you to tell us about your projects
 - Objectives how project fits into long range town or commission plan; what did the project intend to change; path to project acceptance by the town
 - <u>Issues</u> resources used; technical expertise involved; regulatory issues solved; problems or constraints encountered; any funding issues
 - Results what were they; how was the project implemented; what might be done differently

WHAT YOU ARE DOING....

The resulting story is compiled in

- "Celebrating Connecticut's Conservation Commissions: A Guide for Local Action"
- 58 commissions submitted a total of 150 projects
- 57 categories of projects
 - OPEN SPACE (ACQUISITION, FRAGMENTATION, FUNDING, INVENTORY, MANAGEMENT) - 57 projects
 - PUBLIC EDUCATION 25 projects
 - TRAILS, PARKS, GREENWAYS 23 projects
 - POCD 15 projects
 - NATURAL RESOURCE INVENTORY & GIS 16 projects
 - TOWN REGULATIONS 10 projects

C'C'S ARE TAKING ACTION

- Conclusion Conservation Commissions are indeed achieving their purpose
- CCs are raising the environmental consciousness of their communities
- CCs are achieving the respect of community leaders
- CCs are becoming a more effective research and advisory commission

CC POWERS & DUTIES EXPAND

- Over time CC responsibility has increased as well as <u>opportunity for greater impact</u>
 - 1961 NR protection (must conduct research, index open lands)
 - 1963 may apply for OS grants; must approve any town applications
 - 1972 inland wetlands regulation.......
 - 1993 right to inventory open land, formulate water & drought mgt plans, make land use recommendations, manage town open space
 - 1995 plan greenways for inclusion in POCD
 - 1997 funds available for open space acquisition opens a big door

COMBINED COMMISSIONS -CAN THEY DO IT ALL?

CACIWC's POSITION

"CACIWC believes that every CT town should establish a separate, single-agency Conservation Commission, and that the duties and responsibilities of that commission should not be combined with another town board or agency."
